Stanislaus River Day is in support of all our threatened rivers and wild lands. We are alerting the nation to the climax of a crucial battle - the destruction of the Stanislaus is set to begin in November with the start of filling of the Army Corps' New Melones Dam. The Stanislaus is the most popular wilderness recreation area in history to be faced with complete obliteration. The destruction is needless. Even the state long ago recognized that there are no current or foreseeable uses for most of the water from New Melones, and demanded only partial filling of the reservoir.

We are asking President Carter and Governor Brown to allow filling to go no higher than the old Parrotts Ferry Bridge. Both men supported protection of the Stanislaus in the past. This compromise will give us a reservoir and retain the life and the magnificent beauty of the nine mile canyon upstream. 80,000 people will visit the Stanislaus this year alone, and most are deeply moved by the experience. For thousands of people, the Stanislaus is part of our home and part of our lives.

In planting the toyon at the Capitol we are keeping alive one small piece of life, from the lower canyon which will soon be gone. We want everyone to understand that rivers and all our wild lands are living places. The tree symbolizes the choice of life or death which will soon be made for the upper canyon as well - for all its trees and animals, for the flowing, life-giving river itself, and for all the joy, wonder and peace which it can continue to bring to people's spirits. The tree also stands for our hope and our conviction that with 1200 dams already in California, we must and will decide in favor of life for the Stanislaus above Parrotts Ferry.

Now is the time for us to base our actions on real
needs for resources, rather than on greed; to consider
the value of the wild places which people cherish; and to
determine to protect the rest of the life with which we
share the planet.
